Peace Memorial Church, A View to Our Church's History Chapter Three Part 1: Our Pastoral Leadership 1886-1956

Over the course of the history of Peace Memorial Church, we have employed 15 Called (Senior) Pastors as well as a large number of associate and interim ministers to serve our congregation. I have been around long enough to have experienced the various pastoral leadership styles and personalities of nearly half of them. I am neither bragging nor complaining about that, it's just because I am that old! I will cover the first 70 years in this section and the next 68 years in Part 2 and I will try to cover associate ministers and other staff in part 3! In 1886, when Peace Memorial was in its infancy it was called "Die Evangelische Friedens Gemeinde" (The Evangelical Peace Community) and had no designated pastor. History tells me the Rev. W. Hattendorf conducted

the services until 1887 when the congregation called its first pastor, Rev R. Heinze. Rev Heinze was with the congregation for a short time and resigned 1889, during a "very turbulent period!" In 1889 the second pastor, Rev V. Henning was called, and served at the astounding rate of \$40.00 per month until 1891 when he resigned due to issues regarding the church's indebtedness after the construction of the first church building. The cost of that building was \$7,450.00!

Our next pastor, Rev Karl Frietag was with PMC for a period of 13 years. Under Rev Frietag's leadership, history tells me the congregation grew from 345 to over 1,000 members in spite of turmoil and conflict within the congregation. During this period the "Mutual Aid Society" was founded, society members were assessed "premiums" that were used as death benefits to pay for expenses! Also, a second branch congregation was created, St Philipus at 36th and Seely, AND a savings bank was founded due to the questionable reliability of other community banks at the time!

The fourth called pastor at PMC was Rev. Louis Kohlmann, described as "a mild-mannered man with a participative style of leadership". During his years of service, the first Parsonage was built at 52nd and Justine. Rev Kohlmann is responsible for the "Bote" which was the first PMC Messenger, published at that time only in German! Additionally, Rev Kohlmann directed the mission efforts of PMC toward healthcare endeavors, providing active leadership and church financial support to the German Deaconess Hospital at 5400 S Morgan St, a forerunner of today's Advocate Health Care System! SEVERAL years later, I was born at that hospital! Rev Kohlmann was a very interactive pastor and during the Flu pandemic of 1919 made frequent home visits to members suffering from the flu, also conducting 140 funerals in one year! Unfortunately, he became a victim of that pandemic and passed away in late 1919. Our fifth called pastor Rev Herbert J. Brodt who had served as an intern to Rev Frietag in 1904 while in seminary, was called shortly after Rev Kohlmann's passing in 1919. Pastor Brodt has been described as "futuristic and business oriented". I have heard him described by some of our long-time members as very firm in his methods and at times at odds with some of the congregation! Our church history tells me he had some pretty good ideas on how to grow a church. Under his direction two city blocks of Chicago in the area of 78th and Laflin were purchased and sold to church members to fund future building and provide a community for members. In 1922 it was decided to offer a second Sunday service in English at the request of many of the younger members at the time who did not speak German. In 1923 the Parish House was constructed and Sunday services were held there as plans were made for a larger sanctuary to serve the congregation. The Great Depression of the 1930's and World War II significantly delayed the construction of the sanctuary which was not completed until 1951. Both of these structures still stand at 78th and Laflin in Chicago. In the late 30's, after Celebrating its 50th anniversary, the church's name was changed from Die Evangelische Friedens Gemeinde to Peace Memorial Church. In the early 40's the parsonage at 78th street was converted into a nursing home staffed by volunteers serving PMC members only. This set the path for a future nursing home in Evergreen Park. Living up to his strong (many may have called it stubborn) constitution, Pastor Herbert Brodt had a "falling out" with the denomination and Elmhurst College and PMC pulled out of the Evangelical and Reformed (E&R) denomination. Not long after that while seeking contributions to build a

hospital, Pastor Herbert Brodt passed away.

In 1954, PMC called its 7th Senior Pastor, Rev Robert D. Brodt, the son of pastor Herbert Brodt. I am told that Robert had a kinder, gentler style of leadership than his father. He re-established membership in the E&R denomination and established the first Board of Christian Education at Peace Memorial Church. He was a family man who lived with his wife and children just a short walk from the church. Unfortunately, Rev. Bob as many called him, passed away at a very young age in his own home and was unable to continue the legacy his father had started.

I will continue next month's article with Senior Pastor Rev Robert T. Fauth. Pastor Fauth is the first of all the PMC pastors that I can contribute personal accounts. Please let me know if you have questions or comments regarding these PMC history segments. Thanks!


FLOW

It's easy, everything is supposed to be easy. Sometimes we're surrounded by illusions. And illusions can change what we are thinking. Often our negative or fatalistic thinking about ordeals and hardships we're presently suffering sets us down a dark path.

Believe and our life will be transformed. If we can imagine it, we can have it. We are not



limited by logic, the past, or the world around us. Miracles and luck are the outcomes of dreaming and acting despite appearances.

Life takes us where we need to go for reasons that are deeper than our own understanding. Sometimes God uses struggles to build us. Trials can deepen our life experience and spiritual belief system. Surrendering to the moment can help us let go of the stress of trying to force a certain outcome, and provide opportunities for new joys to come our way.
